

Residents of low-lying homes and everyone from Pachena quickly evacuated their homes and gathered at our emergency centre, the Bamfield Marine Station. The taunami speeding south was likely to be 25 feet high. It would have been a great speciacle from the safety of the Marine Station observation deck.

As we all know, the tsunami fizzled out. The tide didn't even go in and out more quickly. No wave happened, but two local residents did make the news in Vancouver: Fred Welland and Bill Petch. People in Prince Rupert crowded the waterfront to watch. It's strange, our fascination with impending and inevitable disaster. We watched for the tidal wave, and enjoyed the sunset and the calm water and the stillness of a lovely spring evening from our porch, high off the water. I'm vary glad we wave disappointed.

Our cover this month is in memory of our friend and faithful companion, Passamaquoddy Maid, who died unexpectedly at the end of April. Only seven. It was refreshing to see a fairly good turnout at the Community Affairs Meeting on April 21st. Thanks to all of you who took the time to come.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank those of you who did not run for re-election to committees. Barb Bunting, Tom Schmidt, Keith Wyton, Kitty Lloyd, and Pat Garcia have given freely of their time and effort to help keep the democratic process alive, and I hope that you all appreciate their efforts as much as I do.

At the April 23rd Regional Board Meeting I asked that a letter be sent requesting that a survey of all non-resident property owners be included in any survey of the community on liquor licensing applications. It was suggested to the Regionsi Board Staff by the Liquor Licensing office that this could be required if so requested. A substantial majority of these at the Community Affairs Meeting folt that his was a reasonable request.

About two months ago, the Regional Board complisioned an economic study of the effects of reduced fishing quotes on the West Coast communities. I have a copy of this study if anyone could like to see it. basically, it very conservatively estitistes a loss of 3 million deflars per year to our region. At the April Board meeting, a committee was struck to ariempt to find ways to increase our input to DFO. I am a member of this commitice, along with the three mayors. Hopsfully I'll have something to report to you next month.

A couple of people have said to me that it seems to them that any rezoning application here receives almost automatic approval. I can understand how this might seem to be the case, but that is only because you don't see what goes on behind the stenes before an application comes to Public Hearing. In many cases applicants talk to me before they even apply. Alcut that they discuss the proposal with the Regional District planning staff, and often with the A.P.C. Suggestions are made to all cases, and it is not unusual for an application to be dropped or substantially modified before Public Hearing. I hope to be able to have our Senior Planner come to the community Affairs Meeting next Fall, to explain the process and answer questions.

Construction of a new access from the back trail to the Outpost Hospital seems again to be an issue, largely because of the efforts of one individual in the community. When one tries to impose his will on others and fails to even try to understand the new problems his solution generates, that individual becomes a liability to the community.

The long arm of coincidence, timing and perhaps fate has reached out and touched the life of Phil Tipler in a way that almost defins explanation.

Phil was born in England in 1927. When he was six, his parents separated and he lived with relatives who had their own six-year-old called Clifford. The two boys became fast friends.

Phil came to Canada at age 11. While serving in the Merchant Navy in World War 2 he had a ten-day leave in England, nine of which he spent searching for his mother, leaving him only one day in her company. Shortly after he returned to Canada he lost his wallet containing her address. He knew he had loads of relatives in England, and likely some in Canada and the U.S., but he had no contacts.

In April of 1985, Phil's stepson, David Bryson, went to Nanaimo Hospital to have a surgical pin removed from a finger he had broken some months previously. He asked his mother, now Mrs. Florence Tipler, to pick him up. When Flo got there the attending ourse, Liz Brockbank, hearing her name, remembered having spect some time, as a child in Ontario, at a place called Tipler's cabin. When Flo got home and told her husband, Phil asked her to get back to the norse and see if she could supply him with the damos and addresses. By a strange coincidence, one of several, Liz had been filling to at the out-patient department for that one evening. When hospital staff found out the reason for the search, they checked evenome called Liz to see who it might have been.

Liz Brockbook wrote to Ontario and came up with a Tipler name and address. Not only did this produce a relative, but another cousin whose daughter had just completed a family chart tracing their line back into the 1706s. Phil got a copy of this and saw the name of his boyhood chum, Clifford. State of the state

Then the search was on for Clifford. The Ontario branch had contacts in England, and one of them located Clifford, now retired after 46 years with the BBC. So Phil and Clifford began a correspondence, leading up to a request that Clifford try to locate Phil's mother.

Finally she was found in Leicester, living in the same house as when Phil had been there in the forcies, and still perky at 79.

Phil leaves for England in May. Clifford will return the Canada with him for Expo and a U.S. tour with Phil and Flo in their matorhome. Meanwhile, Phil has both phone numbers punched into his telephone's memory bank, where one touch of a fingertip brings either Mother or Clifford into his living-room.

David Bryson injures his finger on an outboard motor in early '85 and later just happens to meet a particular nurse at Nanaimo General, who just happens to catch his mother's name. Flo just happened to be there. She merely mentioned it to her husband. Liz Brockbank just happened to be able to locate someone in Outario. Phil's mother happened to be in the same house after all those years. Soon he will be face-to-face with the mother he hasn't seen in over 40 years.

It could all be attributed to a series of lucky coincidences. Or it could be the result of a loose network of random probabilities being woven into a meaningful pattern by an invisible craftsman.

This in turn leads to the question: exactly what is going on, really? But that's another subject.

Extracts from the Carmanah Point lighthouse diaries. Entries made by W.P. Daykin concerning weather and general conditions.

July 13, 1898.

Very fine and clear. I could see men on the lighthouse tower at Cape Flattery. See very smooth but about every half hour all day several beavy rollers came in.

July 19.

Great quantity of salmon along the coast.

July 29.

Sea calm, very fine and smooth; lots of salmon - got five, one King salmon 323 ibs.

August 10.

Midnight. Fog; signal going; light??? Clear as a bell around the lamp and along the beach at times but thick a little way off shore.

August 17,

March 8,



CHICKEN STRIPS MEXICAN STYLE 2 Eggs bottled Taco sauce 1/4 t. salt 1 cup fine dry breadcrumbs 1 t. each: chile powder ground cumin 3/4 t. garlic bowder 1/4 t. oregano leaves 2 whole chicken breasts, boned, skinned and cut into long strips. 1/4 cup butter or margarine 1 ripe avocado 4-6 cups shredded lettuce about 1/2 cup sour cream about 1/2 cup of any spicy mexican sauce. (for dipping) 4 green onions, thinly slided tomato wedges

lemon or lime wedges .

in a shallow bowl, beat together eggs, three Tablespoons taco sauce and salt. In another bowl, combine breadcrumbs, chili powder, cumin, garlic powder and oregano. Dip each chicken piece into egg mixture, then breadcrumb mix, then egg mix and crumb mixture again.

Melt butter in 350'F oven. Remove pan from oven, add chicken strips, turn to coat with butter. Bake uncovered in 350' oven for about 20 minutes, or until tender and crisp outside.

To serve, arrange chicken on bed of lettuce. Garnish with green onions, sliced avocado, tomato wedges and lemon. Serve with sour cream and hot sauce.

JACKIE'S APPLE CRISP bu Jackie Dennis Gr. 7 8 Apples 1 cup flour 1 cup sugar 1 cup brown sugar 1 cup rolled oats 1 tsp venille -1 cup butter 1) Mix up flour, sugar, brown sugar, colled cats, vanilla and butter. 2) Cut apples up so that it makes 4 cups. 3) Get a large pan so that the apples cover the battom of the pen. 4) Then cover the apples with the flour, brown sugar, sugar etc. 5) Then put over on at 350' and leave in oven for 40 to 45 minutes or until apples are soft. 6) Let it cool for 10 or 15 minutes.

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So, here I am wavering between the urge to rush outside in the pouring rain, raise my first up towards the sky, and scream at the weatherman, or just resign myself to indoors for enother stretch. As you see, the indoor occupations have won, but I must admit there are compensations sometimes. Here we spend more time then really justified just grabbing at binoculars to scan the trees or ground for another bird which has just flown in. Tends to prolong breakfast time tremendously.

During the past few weeks we have duly admired the Golden-Crowned Sparrows that have checked the area over for seeds those are Bernadette's special pets from a few years back. They have a tendency to be very hard on early gardens. Have also noticed a flock of starlings, back egain for another season. Despite their bad reputation they can make quite a clean sweep of the bug population. I wonder if they clear out the cutworms and carwigs) Right about there I'd almost welcome them. Today found another bird on the not-so-welcome list probing the lawn for bugs, the Brown-headed Cowbird. These last-named birds can cortotaly wreak havoc among the small birds. They have little to do with domestic duties - merely laying one of their large-sized eggs in the nest of a much smaller warbler, sparrow, or other, and promptly taking off, leaving brooding duties and feeding of the results to the overworked warbles or sparrow. The bird they choose for this operous task is usually unable to roll the offending egg out of the nest and so finally accepts the situation and rears this larger intruder - sometimes even the young cowbird will push the legitimate babies out of the nest to rid itself of the competition for feed. Meanwhile, Ma and Pa Cowbird are off merrily looking after themselves alone.

The Stellar's Jay is another reacal in the crowd. In this case he is usually after the eggs or bables in other birds nests, and can swiftly wreak havor on a Robin's nest or any other of the smaller birds. He is such a handsome bird that I don't like chasing him, but during the nesting season usually scold him when he heads over towards known nest areas. (Somethnes he stops and listens to mel) This year I might be extra tough on him, as we have seen some special birds we would like the encourage as new inhabitants.

Within the past week two pair of Townsend's have been busily flitting eround collecting insects in the trees and on the ground. What a sight - a flash of bright yellow with black eccenting the color slerts you to this one's identity. The adult male in breeding dress sports a black-black crown, cheek patch, and throat, with black streaks down the breast - the bright yellow seems to encircle the black eye in a triangular shape, with more yellow in the breast turning into white on the underparts. A lively shade of gray shows up on the wings with white wing bars and some black showing up on the gray tall - as well as on the olivey-greenish-yellow back. (Hope you can figure that one out.) The adult female has the same head markings but on a more muted tone of cool gray instead of black-black.

Audobon's Warblers have also put in an appearance. Slightly iess striking than the Townsend's, they sport a bright yellow throat patch, as well as a yellow crown patch and, just forward of the wings, two yellow patches. The breast is not as streeked as Townsend's, and mostly white, the rest of the bird being pearly gray interspersed with white. Always someone wants to change things, and in the National Geographic Field Guide the Audobons's Warbler and the Myrtle Warbler are being called Yellow-rumped Warbler. Personally I like the separate names as they were.


Of note also are the tiny Ruby-Crowned Kinglets which have been filting about twittering happily as they glean the tiny insects from the trees. Apparently they are fond of the spruce bud moth, which should make these little birds popular with the forestry people.

Some flocks of Pine Siskins are about, putting on their spectacular aerobatic displays. Large flocks, comprised of hundreds of individuals will suddenly take off on precision flying maneuvers as they circle around from one tree to the next. Pat Garcla has been trying to identify some elusive birds which spent a short time around her place. From the description, they were possibly the House Finch or the Purple Finch, which are both know to come into this region.

'Rather please with myself also, that I finally identified to my satisfaction - Surfbirds - which spend a fair amount of time in large flocks at the waters edge, twittering loudiy to all and sundry. My waterbird i.d.'s are strictly limited. Must rectify that some day!

Okay folks, that's all for now. Lo and behold - my reward

seems to be that the sun is once more shining. Happy birding, and I'll endeavor to get back to the Wrens next time. Also will tell you a bit more about Menus for birds.

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
