Bamfield was the perfect fit for Al, and he stayed in the community for nearly 20 years, working as the Marine Station chef, and also operating a successful bakery and restaurant. In the political arena, he served his community for many years as its Regional Director. At the Bamfield Marine Station, he increased the collective girth of the hungry student population and visiting scientists with legendary homemade breads and pastries, and many wonderful meals. He was known, on occasion, to terrorize vegetarians and took particular umbrage to any students who dared incite a food fight. Always a great storyteller, Al kept us in stitches with his colourful humour. One of his more memorable outings was

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attending a dance at the Community Hall dressed as my sister (we were about the same height). He shaved off the goatee, donned a dress, nylons, heels, the whole works. At the dance, Mr. Carl Ostrom was looking quite intrigued by this new woman in town, and leaned over to whisper in my ear, "Who's the ugly chick?". At Al's request, there will not be a ser-

vice, but I think he would certainly approve of you raising a glass in his honour, preferably beneath the night sky overlooking the ocean. Many a night, you could hear Al singing "The stars at night, are big and bright, deep in the heart of Bamfield". Fair winds and following seas ... Kathy Durante

BC's Provincial bird, the Steller jay, status challenged. The rufous hummingbird is suggested as the better BC repre-

sentative. Also, the bird's namesake, **George Wilhelm Steller** (1709-1746) naturalist, physician and explorer may have a tainted past.
Other critters so named: Steller's sea eagle, Steller's eider duck, Steller sea lion, and Steller's sea cow. The sea cow is extinct, and, from George's notes, he and his crew probably contributed to the loss of this docile vegetarian.
