

Gentry exposed. It was love at first sight when Vancouver stockbroker John Evans visited Bamfield, in 1972. He bought a waterfront property, built a home with stone from his beach and aptly named it Swn-y-mor, or Sound of the Sea, after a cheap Welsh whiskey. With a huge copper clad fireplace, rustic beams, and family antiques, he recreated an authentic Welsh cottage and made it the social hub of the village. A small cannon in the yard would be fired with an eardrum shattering blast, to celebrate birthdays, his annual New Year's shoot, or as he guipped on national TV, (the 1st episode of Still Standing, still available on Gem), on the rare occasions when he got aroused.

Many back and forth years later, often flying his own float plane, John retired to Bamfield.

His days started with cigarettes and strong coffee with a liberal dash of cognac kept in easy reach on a side-board covered in bottles, many of them special liqueurs used in his fabulous culinary offerings. No meal was complete without a "pudding" loaded with butter or lard and topped with whipped cream. Guests felt like bit players in an episode of Masterpiece Theatre, as the Lord of the Manor, in velvet dinner jacket (from his favourite Kitsilano haberdashery, the Maple Street Salvation Army), entertained us locals with amusing stories featuring his large circle of wealthy, often eccentric, friends. Despite his disdain for healthy habits, John has outlived most of them.

The twice divorced, self-described "swordsman," was prone to enthusiastic crushes on younger women. He favoured women under 40. Just before turning 80, he met the beautiful TV chef, Laura Calder, not quite 40, who was inspired to dedicate her next cookbook, "with much love, to my dear friend and the best host I ever met, John Evans." The relationship couldn't be expected to last, but his luck with women continued. His final years in Bamfield were made possible by Klara Bebee, who had nursed two elderly husbands and wasn't yet ready to retire, so she answered an ad placed on alberni.net by John's son, Oliver. Klara worked wonders on the irascible patient until John required more care. When he moved his father into a fancy facility in Pt. Grey, Oliver placed an online ad for a companion: "Must have an interest in WWII, Winston Churchill," etc. The position was filled by an extremely attractive, younger woman, who had travelled the world crewing luxury yachts, His charm is still intact; they get along famously. *Judith Philips*

New Hall roars ahead. At its March 5th Zoom meeting the Community Hall Board reviewed and approved the architectural drawings, understanding that dedication of actual space for peripheral activities (Historical Soc., and such) are confirmed and will be defined later.
