We have history, proudly presented by the Bamfield Historical Society. Authors Ian Kennedy and Margarete Horsfield entertained and informed a large crowd and several mosquitoes with historic notes from their book, The Best Loved Boat: The Princess Maguinna & West Coast History. First, we learned the Princess Maguinna was the only ship of the Princess fleet with an indigenous name. Ian and Margarete took us on a tour of her stops from Victoria to the north end of Vancouver Island, showing us the travel customs and what the villages were like in the early 1900 hundreds. Tidbits included observations that the complex schedule of the Princess Maguinna was interrupted by a Vancouver radio talk show host who said where she was at any particular time. An interesting aside, for me, was the description of the Minnesota Seaside Station at Port Renfrew. This was the second station on the west coast of North America. The American invader, Professor Josephine Tilden, brought students and researchers to our shores for six years, under harsh but memorable conditions. (I conducted seaweed studies there for six years during the 1960s. Spectacular!) Memberships were sold and \$380 was raised from the sale of West Coast relicts provided by the Jennings Family and Brian Gisborne. Thank you BHS for a delightful evening. L. Druehl

<u>The Bamfield Historical Society's</u> July 17th meeting was at BMSC with featured speakers, **Margaret Horsfield** and fellow historian, **Ian Kennedy**. A high school teacher, Kennedy



wrote two popular guides to pubs in BC, travelling the province on his motorcycle in the summer holidays; "Sunny, Sandy, Savary Island," (where his wife owned a cabin for 40 years); and as a rugby journalist, reported on rugby games from around the world. Born in Port Alberni, Horsfield spent several years abroad getting an education, then working as a freelance broadcaster

and journalist for such august institutions as the BBC, Radio Four, and the CBC radio. Back on the Island in 1993, she turned to writing books. The award-winning 1999 BC bestseller, "Cougar Annie's Garden" made her a household name. She followed that in 2008, with an intimate look at the characters who founded the white settlement of Tofino, "Voices from the Sound." The two co-wrote 2014's, "Tofino and Clayoquot Sound: A History." It was well-received, warranting re-issue in paperback last year, when Kennedy's BC bestseller, "Best Loved Boat: A History of the Princess Maquinna," was also published.
